

Frank McClarin High School's General Educational Development Diploma Program can assist you* to earn your high school equivalency diploma which is issued by the Georgia Department of Technical and Adult Education, Mr. Ron Jackson, Commissioner. (*limited space) The GED program is a dropout prevention / academic achievement / career planning program which meets from August to May. To enroll, a student must be 18 to 21 years old, with 11 or less credits, two or more years from graduation, withdrawal form from high school, prepared for an interview, motivated to learn, ready to study and pass the following tests with a score high above the minimum standard score of 410.

800 is the highest score which can be earned for an individual subject area test. If a student is organized and studies using the six step plan, completes homework assignments, uses databases, and the practice tests, including The Official GED Practice Test; he/she will be eligible for a high score!
