

Fulton County Schools Student Device Selection Process

How are student devices selected at Fulton County Schools?

At the District level, Fulton County Schools (FCS) solicited a Request for Proposals for student devices. This RFP allowed FCS to select multiple devices that meet the district's requirements for personalized learning. These devices are listed in a "marketplace" of options from which schools can choose.

Keeping with FCS' philosophy of local school autonomy, schools will make the ultimate decision on which option best meets their students' unique needs.

School Level Process

As schools begin to implement personalized learning, they will go through a process of instructional planning, professional development, and then the roll out of student devices. During this process, schools will take the following steps to choose their student device:

- 1. Form a device selection committee. The school forms a device selection committee to vet and recommend a student device. Selection committees should include students (for middle and high school), teachers, parents, and administration. When asking someone to join the selection committee, have them sign a statement that they have no conflict of interest (see FAQs). If there is a conflict of interest, the potential committee member may not participate in the device selection process.
- **2. Review and test the devices in the marketplace.** FCS provides a list of the devices available in the marketplace, with some high level information on their specifications. Selection committee members have a chance to use and test all the device options.
- **3. Score each device on a rubric.** Selection committees will use the attached rubric and scoring sheet to evaluate each device. They can either come to a consensus on each number that populates the rubric, or average the individual responses.

4. School Governance Council (SGC) Vote

- To be involved with SGC consideration of the recommendation, SGC members must first
 review the list of devices in the marketplace. If an SGC member has a financial interest or
 relationship with one of the devices, vendors, or manufacturers, the SGC member will
 recuse him or herself from any discussion or vote on the device recommendation (see
 FAQs and Conflict of Interest form, which each SGC member will be required to complete
 prior to participation).
- The selection committee presents their final rubric scores and recommends the device with the highest score to their SGC.
- SGC monitors that the process was followed and votes to approve the recommendation of the school's selection committee. A majority vote is required.
- Sample motion statement: "I move that we approve the [school name] device selection committee's recommendation."



FAQs

Do schools get extra support if they choose a less expensive device?

Schools that select a Chromebook or Dell Latitude will receive an embedded KSU instructional coach for 4 semesters (180 full days per year). This is in addition to the shared coach every school receives during their planning year. This person will be an employee of the KSU iTeach Center; KSU will hire them in accordance with school preferences and input.

How should we form the device selection committee? The principal or his/her designee should form the selection committee. Devices are an <u>instructional tool</u> (like a textbook), and so the <u>selection committee should be made up primarily of educators</u> who can assess whether the device fits the school's instructional strategies.

Recommended members include:

- Principal or other school leader
- Teachers (2-3)
- Students (1-2, for middle and high schools)
- Parents (1-2)

Can the selection committee include School Governance Council members? Yes, the selection committee can include a subset of SGC members.

Can the SGC just serve as the Selection Committee? No, the SGC should maintain its governance role. The device selection committee members are best positioned to assess device instructional fit and therefore it is that committee's responsibility to review the devices and make a recommendation. The SGC's responsibility is to assess that the recommendation is sound, but not to assess the devices themselves.

Why is the SGC approving the recommendation? Personalized learning will have a significant impact on student learning experiences including what, how, where and when students learn. The device selection is a major decision in enabling this shift. Given the SGC is charged with setting and supporting the school strategic plan, it is appropriate for the SGC to review the recommendation of the selection committee and ensure the recommendation will support the strategic efforts and vision for the school.

How will the selection committee make their recommendation?

The selection committee will test the devices in the marketplace and evaluate them on the rubric below. Student devices are an instructional tool (like a textbook), so the selection committee's job is to choose the device that best fits the school's instructional model. The recommendation must be made on instructional fit, not on personal preference.

Can an SGC member vote No?

An SGC member can vote "No" if s/he believes the process was not followed with fidelity. If the final outcome of the SGC vote is a majority "No," the selection committee should go back and do further review, making sure to address concerns of the SGC, and then request the SGC review and approve the revised recommendation.



What if a selection committee or SGC member has a connection to one of the companies being considered?

Under the "School Governance Council Handbook," Section IV, Paragraph A(6), "[A]ny Council member that has a conflict of interest or the appearance of a conflict of interest on a matter before the Council must recuse himself/herself from the discussion and voting on that matter." In Section IV, Paragraph A(2), the conflict of interest may extend to immediate family members where material financial interests are present.

When Selection Committee and SGC members are provided the list of marketplace options for student devices, all Selection Committee and SGC members should assess whether they or any members of their immediate family have financial interests, including stock or employment, in the companies. If so, they should recuse themselves from the selection committee or the SGC from debate and voting.

What types of questions should the SGC ask when reviewing the Selection Committee's recommendation?

What if we are already using a device in the marketplace and think we want to stick with that one? Each school is required to test the *entire* marketplace and follow the rubric. This is to ensure you choose the best product for your students, and also to ensure that the decision on how to spend taxpayer money is made in a fair and transparent way.

If you have familiarity with using one of the devices in the marketplace for instruction, the device selection committee can include this as part of its evaluation and included as a factor in the "Compatibility with digital resources/content" or "Ease of use in your environment" categories.

What if we want to purchase devices outside of the marketplace?

FCS does not dictate how schools choose to spend their local funds, but devices purchased outside of the marketplace will not be paid for with SPLOST dollars and will not receive technical support from the district. Our IT staff will be trained only to support and fix the devices in the marketplace.

What if my school doesn't have an SGC?

For schools without an SGC the district's Instructional Technology department will review and approve the selection committee's recommendation.
