 This course is designed to introduce students to the systematic and scientific study of the behavior and mental processes of human beings and other animals. Students are exposed to the psychological facts, principles, and phenomena associated with each of the major subfields within psychology. They also learn about the ethics and methods psychologists use in their science and practice.




Ability to memorize many concepts and think abstractly

WHAT KIND OF TIME COMMITMENT IS EXPECTED?

- 2 Hours of reading and note taking per week/reviewing notes.
- Extra time to prepare for final exam and AP Test.

THE AP EXAM

- The AP Psychology Exam consists of two parts, organized as follows:
 - Section 1
 - Multiple-Choice questions (100 questions, 70 minutes, counts 2/3rd of the score)
 - Section 2
 - Free Response Questions (2 questions, 50 minutes, counts 1/3rd of the score)



- Average Grade in Class = 86 (plus 7pts)
- % pass AP Score in typical
 Year = 97%+
- % pass with a 4 or 5 = 76%+
- Pages in textbook to read= 871
- Essays written = about 10 per year
- Major Projects = 4 per year
