#### The AP Exam

- The AP U.S. History Exam consists of four parts, organized as follows:
  - Section 1
  - Part A: Multiple-choice questions (55 questions)
  - Part B: Short-answer questions (3 questions)
  - Section 2
  - Part A: Document-based question (1 question)
  - Part B: Long response question (1 question)



## Statistics about AP US History

- Average Grade in Class = 83 (plus 7pts)
- Average AP Score = 4.1
- % pass AP Score in typical Year = 90%+
- $\bullet$  % pass with a 4 or 5 = 75%+
- Pages in Text Book read = about 1000
- Chapter Review sheets completed = 34
- Essays written = about 10 -12 per year
- Major Projects = 2

# Why should you take AP US instead of regular US History?

- Academic challenge
- Develop deeper understanding of our history
- Great class discussion
- Probable college credit
