



Phonemic Awareness



Phonemic awareness is essential in teaching students to be automatic decoders of print.

The Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum provides students with consistent and repeated instruction, and this transfers to developing a student's decoding and encoding skills.

The lessons are designed to provide daily instruction in eight phonological and phonemic awareness skills.


Students practice blending, segmenting, and manipulating words, syllables, and phonemes each day.

Phonics



The 95 Phonics Core Program (PCP) is a whole-class, supplemental phonics curriculum.

This Tier I program is designed for students to address and prevent reading gaps using explicit, structured phonics instruction for 20-30 minutes per day






- Addition and Subtraction to 20 (Fluently add and subtract within 10)





Theme: American Heroes

- Unit 1: Our Earth, Our Home (Students need to locate all 7 continents and the 5 major oceans. They will also identify and locate their city, county, state, country, and continent on a map.)
- Unit 2: George Washington Carver

- Unit 4: Thomas Jefferson
- · Unit 5: Lewis and Clark & Sacagawea
- · Unit 6: Ruby Bridges
- · Unit 7: Theodore Roosevelt
- Unit 8: Personal Finance

Each unit will involve studying the contribution, geographic setting, character, everyday life, and economic choices of the American Hero.

- We will not have required homework yet. However, please still work with your child at home. How?
- Read with your child each night.
- Use the "I can" statements from newsletters to practice skills.
- View weekly videos in newsletter together.



What can you do at home?

• <u>Fluency</u>

- Fluency is the ability to read at a good pace with accuracy and expression.
- Read in longer phrases, not one word at a time.
- If they get stuck on a word, STOP, remind them to use word solving strategies, then have them go back and re-read.
- Support expression by talking about the mood of the story or the mood of a character using dialogue.
- Remind them to pay attention to punctuation to help with expression.

Word Solving

- Finger stretch the letter sounds, then put the parts together to say the word.
- Use context clues to decide what word would make sense.
- Look through the WHOLE word, part-by-part.
- Reread and ask, "Does that sound right?".
- Understanding the vocabulary!

Reading Comprehension practice

Comprehension

 Ideas to talk about: Follow up with "How do you know...?" or "Why do you think that?" to practice using text evidence.

• Fiction:

- Predictions
- Characters- traits, feelings, how they change
- Story- problem, solution, important events, lesson

Non-Fiction:

- Facts being learned
- How it adds to what they already know
- Main ideas- what is the page or chapter mostly teaching about?

Math Practice at Home

- Practice writing numbers 1-120
- Bundling items in groups of ten
- Create story problems during dinner
- Card game War (helps practice greater and less)
- Number Games: Pick a number between 1-120. Have your child guess the number, then tell if your number was greater or less than their guess, keep revising until they guess
- Board games where they have to count the spaces
- Practice math facts (basic addition and subtraction to 10, then extend once mastered)

Grading Weights

Grading Categories

Major: An assignment or assessment that is cumulative in nature that measures learning targets from multiple standards/skills.

Minor: An assignment or assessment that measures an individual learning target, standard, or subset of learning targets/standards/ skills within a unit.

Practice: Daily assignments, observations, and/or engagement activities given in class or for homework to build pre-requisite skills, measure progress towards mastery of a learning target or standard, enrich, and/or remediate skills.

PBIS supports positive behavior and interventions to create the most effective learning environment for all students.


During the first two weeks of school, students have been taught our school-wide expectations.
